STUDENT SPOTLIGHT

Nick Reid

How did you become interested in informatics?

I'd been involved in UX and Web 2.0, but loved public health. I thought computers and public health meant epidemiology, but when I first applied to graduate school, I got rejected. Later, I attended the American Public Health Association conference, met public health informatics fellows, and realized the wide scope of how technology can support public health.

What are your research interests?

My research focuses on supporting people who are making decisions about their health. Traditionally this means building decision aids, but I'm much more interested in how a person's information environment can be shaped to support "better" decisions.

How is the Consumer Informatics Working Group (CHIWG) different from other Working Groups?

In CHIWG, the people who receive healthcare are at the center and there seems to be a revolution brewing to make the "patient" voice more prevalent at AMIA. What I've enjoyed most as a student in CHIWG is how welcoming and collaborative the group is. It has gone far beyond any expectation I had. I haven't been involved in other AMIA working groups, so I can't really compare -- I imagine other groups are also nice.

What can students learn from the CHIWG?

We frequently discuss methods for engaging communities in research. Often, the discussion goes beyond what is published to the nuances that make effective partnership and leadership.

What advice would you offer to fellow students in or just starting in informatics?

My favorite piece of advice is to be selfish with your interests and don't let other people define what your interests are. What fascinates me about informatics is the variety of interests and possible interactions between fields. There is plenty of space for anyone's unique interest.
